NCASES Was Created by NAPSEC because...

growth in the number of special education agencies has resulted in

- need to maintain quality control within private special education schools
- need to maintain and improve quality in the industry

NCASES Was Created Out of...

increased national concern for accountability and for rights of persons with disabilities.

Accreditation-

- assists students & families in selecting a quality agency.
- identifies agencies worthy of financial support.

Mission Statement

• To insure that a set of standards exists that allows special education agencies to voluntarily validate their purpose by being measured against national standards relative to the best current practices available in special education.

NCASES Leadership

- Commission minimum of nine members
- who are experts in the field of private special education
- with demonstrated leadership and advanced training

NCASES Commission Duties

- Oversee all processes of NCASES
- Review and revise standards
- Review survey reports
- Make all accreditation decisions

Features of NCASES Accreditation

- Published objective guidelines & materials
- Self-study
- Review by practicing, experienced, trained educators with oversight by Commission
- Option of integrated survey with Council on Accreditation (COA)
- Validated relevant & challenging standards

Accreditation Standards

- Standards Manual
 - Consists of nine sections of standards
 - First eight sections apply to all agencies

Accreditation Standards

- Specific Program/Service Standards
 - Day Programs
 - Residential Programs

Accreditation Standards

- Core versus Non-Core Standards
 - CORE deemed important for a quality
 program in bold type in manual must fully
 comply with all

Non CORE

- Standards applicable to all programs
- Appear in standard type
- Program must be in compliance with 90%

Why Seek NCASES Accreditation

- Promotion of culture of excellence and validation of desirable practices
- Comparison by experts in the field against best-practice standards
- Opportunity for self-assessment
- Recognition and fundraising enhancement
- Potential savings of time and money in doing integrated COA survey

Accreditation Eligibility

- Has been in operation at least two years
- Provide special education services
- Provide services eligible for accreditation
- Provide services in defined, identifiable programs
- Directly employ staff to provide services
- Have appropriate state licensure/approval

Accreditation Steps

- Letter requesting application packet
- Application completed and submitted
- Self-study submitted a minimum of four weeks before Site Review Team Visit
- Visit by Site Review Team
- Site Review Team written report received
- Response to written report (if required)
- Accreditation decision by Commission

Accreditation Process Self-study Phase

- Organization confirms strong leadership commitment
- Accreditation preparation committee formed
- Sub-committees established to focus on specific sections of standards
- Self-study form completed and submitted

Accreditation Process On-site Review

- Visits last two and one-half days Monday,
 Tuesday, and Wednesday
- Reviewers provide verification of organization's compliance with standards

Accreditation Process Follow-up to On-site Review

- Review NCASES Team's written report and submit written response in agreement to the report or comments/questions on specific areas
- Once report is accepted, report is reviewed by Commission for accreditation decision

Scoring of Standards

- Full Compliance: compliance is unequivocal & readily documented "to the letter of the law"
- Substantial Compliance: compliance is demonstrated with some deviation from standard or documentation of full compliance is not available or appropriate "to the letter of the law"
- Non-compliance: compliance cannot be demonstrated
